Instead, I thought, "Well, that is ambiguous." But, the sign stuck with me that day, and it came up again when I read the U.S. Supreme Court's recent decision in Abramski v. United States, a decision that involved competing interpretations of the "plain meaning" of a statute regulating the purchase of guns.
